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00:00:33,733 --> 00:00:36,500 my goal today though is to help you 13 00:00:36,500 --> 00:00:38,866 learn a little bit about the process

14 00:00:38,866 --> 00:00:40,833 here at the University of Delaware for

15 00:00:40,833 --> 00:00:44,600 securing grants, and to spend a fair

16 00:00:44,600 --> 00:00:47,333 amount of time going over the databases

17 00:00:47,333 --> 00:00:49,633 that we have that are good for zeroing

18 00:00:49,633 --> 00:00:53,100 in on funders. I don't think I need to

19 00:00:53,100 --> 00:00:57,200 remind you that funding is very

20 00:00:57,200 --> 00:01:00,800 competitive, and you know it pays to kind

21 00:01:00,800 --> 00:01:02,766 of do your homework, make sure you're

22 00:01:02,766 --> 00:01:04,233 approaching the right people. And that's

23 00:01:04,233 --> 00:01:06,300 what we're going to be focusing on.

24 00:01:06,300 --> 00:01:09,366 Normally we try to begin the workshop 25 00:01:09,366 --> 00:01:12,966 with representatives from the Research

26 00:01:12,966 --> 00:01:16,100 Office, and the Development Office but

27 00:01:16,100 --> 00:01:19,233 they were unable to attend today. But

28 00:01:19,233 --> 00:01:21,666 they did ask me to pass along their good

29 00:01:21,666 --> 00:01:24,466 wishes and make sure that you knew they

30 00:01:24,466 --> 00:01:27,366 existed and how to find them. You'll

31 00:01:27,366 --> 00:01:30,100 notice I gave you an agenda and at the

32 00:01:30,100 --> 00:01:32,566 bottom of the agenda there is a box with

33 00:01:32,566 --> 00:01:36,433 various links that are useful for grant

34 00:01:36,433 --> 00:01:39,933 seeking, and there is a link here to the

35 00:01:39,933 --> 00:01:43,866 Research Office and also a link to the

36 00:01:43,866 --> 00:01:46,700 Development Office. I mentioned this 37 00:01:46,700 --> 00:01:51,266 because if you are applying for grants

38 00:01:51,266 --> 00:01:56,266 through the University, not necessarily

39 00:01:56,266 --> 00:01:58,566 to fund your own personal research but

40 00:01:58,566 --> 00:02:01,400 if you are engaged in a project that is

41 00:02:01,400 --> 00:02:04,300 going to be sponsored by the University

42 00:02:04,300 --> 00:02:07,933 you truly need to touch base with the

43 00:02:07,933 --> 00:02:10,033 Research Office and the Development

44 00:02:10,033 --> 00:02:15,266 Office. They can then guide you

45 00:02:15,266 --> 00:02:17,833 through the process - particularly any

46 00:02:17,833 --> 00:02:21,900 grants (federal grants

47 00:02:21,900 --> 00:02:25,500 that go out of the University), they have

48 00:02:25,500 --> 00:02:28,666 to be submitted by the Research Office. 49 00:02:28,666 --> 00:02:33,433 Similarly, the Research Office looks at

50 00:02:33,433 --> 00:02:35,900 at grants that are going out from other

51 00:02:35,900 --> 00:02:38,000 institutions to make sure that

52 00:02:38,000 --> 00:02:41,566 everything is in place. My understanding

53 00:02:41,566 --> 00:02:44,600 is that if you're applying say as a

54 00:02:44,600 --> 00:02:48,466 faculty member for summer funding, it

55 00:02:48,466 --> 00:02:50,966 depends on how the funding

56 00:02:50,966 --> 00:02:53,800 opportunity is written as to whether or

57 00:02:53,800 --> 00:02:56,400 not you need to apply as an individual

58 00:02:56,400 --> 00:02:59,600 person or apply through the University.

59 00:02:59,600 --> 00:03:02,733 So if you have any questions at all

60 00:03:02,733 --> 00:03:05,033 about that I would highly recommend 61 00:03:05,033 --> 00:03:07,600 you're giving the Research Office a call.

62 00:03:07,600 --> 00:03:10,166 Besides they're good people to get to

63 00:03:10,166 --> 00:03:12,666 know. And you should have in your

64 00:03:12,666 --> 00:03:14,666 department too

65 00:03:14,666 --> 00:03:18,600 a liaison who can help to guide you

66 00:03:18,600 --> 00:03:21,100 through the process. Let me just take

67 00:03:21,100 --> 00:03:23,366 a minute and go over to the Research Office

68 00:03:23,366 --> 00:03:27,500 website. So here we are at the

69 00:03:27,500 --> 00:03:31,333 university homepage and if we go over to

70 00:03:31,333 --> 00:03:34,700 "Research and Innovation" we can link

71 00:03:34,700 --> 00:03:39,800 through to the Research Office. Then

72 00:03:39,800 --> 00:03:42,633 you have the exact address on your on 73 00:03:42,633 --> 00:03:45,133 your page. And so here you have the

74 00:03:45,133 --> 00:03:47,700 Research Office website. There is a

75 00:03:47,700 --> 00:03:52,466 category for researchers. You can go

76 00:03:52,466 --> 00:03:55,033 straight in there. And here you have the

77 00:03:55,033 --> 00:03:57,733 "Researcher's Toolbox". But there's also a

78 00:03:57,733 --> 00:04:01,866 staff directory, and this is where you

79 00:04:01,866 --> 00:04:04,900 can begin to see who in your department

80 00:04:04,900 --> 00:04:10,433 is responsible for managing grants. So

81 00:04:10,433 --> 00:04:13,933 here you'll see who your contact person

82 00:04:13,933 --> 00:04:17,666 is in the Research Office, and then

83 00:04:17,666 --> 00:04:20,066 you'll also see who your department

84 00:04:20,066 --> 00:04:23,566 administrator is. That's what you 85 00:04:23,566 --> 00:04:25,500 would... Those are the people that you

86 00:04:25,500 --> 00:04:29,100 would need to talk to as you begin to

87 00:04:29,100 --> 00:04:32,166 think about who you're going to approach.

88 00:04:32,166 --> 00:04:35,433 Let's just say you've found a great

89 00:04:35,433 --> 00:04:38,000 private foundation that you would like

90 00:04:38,000 --> 00:04:39,133 to contact,

91 00:04:39,133 --> 00:04:42,800 or submitted a proposal to. You're not

92 00:04:42,800 --> 00:04:45,000 sure whether or not you need to go in as

93 00:04:45,000 --> 00:04:48,600 an individual or as a foundation? What

94 00:04:48,600 --> 00:04:50,666 you wanted, or I mean, or an organization.

95 00:04:50,666 --> 00:04:52,733 what you want to do is contact the

96 00:04:52,733 --> 00:04:56,333 Development Office, for a couple of 97 00:04:56,333 --> 00:04:59,366 reasons. The Development Office is

98 00:04:59,366 --> 00:05:01,466 very critical in developing

99 00:05:01,466 --> 00:05:04,266 relationships with private foundations

100 00:05:04,266 --> 00:05:07,200 and companies. And a lot of times they

101 00:05:07,200 --> 00:05:09,466 can kind of clear some paths for you.

102 00:05:09,466 --> 00:05:12,500 What they generally ask before you come

103 00:05:12,500 --> 00:05:16,100 to them is that you have a budget, a

104 00:05:16,100 --> 00:05:18,633 brief description of the project that

105 00:05:18,633 --> 00:05:20,933 you want to do (in a timeline), and

106 00:05:20,933 --> 00:05:24,800 departmental approval to pursue it. So

107 00:05:24,800 --> 00:05:28,066 and then you set an appointment with

108 00:05:28,066 --> 00:05:31,200 them and they'll ask you why you think 109 00:05:31,200 --> 00:05:33,766 it's the foundation you're interested in

110 00:05:33,766 --> 00:05:36,933 is a good match. So with that information

111 00:05:36,933 --> 00:05:41,600 you can then be prepared to go

112 00:05:41,600 --> 00:05:45,500 forward. But anyway, here you have the

113 00:05:45,500 --> 00:05:47,366 website for corporate and foundation

114 00:05:47,366 --> 00:05:51,500 relations. You can go through and read

115 00:05:51,500 --> 00:05:54,100 what they have on what's called prospect

116 00:05:54,100 --> 00:05:57,133 clearance. That's the the discussion that

117 00:05:57,133 --> 00:05:59,800 you have with them prior to making an

118 00:05:59,800 --> 00:06:03,800 approach to a corporation or a

119 00:06:03,800 --> 00:06:07,166 foundation. Not only can they clear the

120 00:06:07,166 --> 00:06:09,466 way for you sometimes because of the 121 00:06:09,466 --> 00:06:11,833 relationships they've established but

122 00:06:11,833 --> 00:06:16,066 also there are instances where certain

123 00:06:16,066 --> 00:06:18,733 foundations or corporations are targeted

124 00:06:18,733 --> 00:06:22,333 for really large gifts. Say for capital

125 00:06:22,333 --> 00:06:24,566 campaign for the University... And they

126 00:06:24,566 --> 00:06:27,333 plan on approaching the foundation to

127 00:06:27,333 --> 00:06:30,300 ask for over a million dollars. And if

128 00:06:30,300 --> 00:06:33,133 that's the case they may not welcome a

129 00:06:33,133 --> 00:06:36,166 lot of independent researchers from the

130 00:06:36,166 --> 00:06:38,100 University approaching the same

131 00:06:38,100 --> 00:06:40,133 foundation asking for much smaller

132 00:06:40,133 --> 00:06:43,100 grants. Because then, when the University 133 00:06:43,100 --> 00:06:46,200 makes its official approach they the

134 00:06:46,200 --> 00:06:48,000 foundation could say well I've already

135 00:06:48,000 --> 00:06:50,600 given to the University of Delaware. The

136 00:06:50,600 --> 00:06:52,566 Disaster Research Center.

137 00:06:52,566 --> 00:06:54,900 And that wouldn't be so good. So that's

138 00:06:54,900 --> 00:06:57,366 another reason why you want to reach out

139 00:06:57,366 --> 00:07:02,100 to the Development Office and have a

140 00:07:02,100 --> 00:07:05,433 conversation with them. So just to

141 00:07:05,433 --> 00:07:07,200 reiterate grant seeking really is a

142 00:07:07,200 --> 00:07:09,033 process. You know what they say, "There's

143 00:07:09,033 --> 00:07:11,033 no such thing as a free lunch." You really

144 00:07:11,033 --> 00:07:14,233 do have to work for your grant. It's a 145 00:07:14,233 --> 00:07:16,733 lot more than just sitting down and

146 00:07:16,733 --> 00:07:20,200 shooting off a canned proposal. First of

147 00:07:20,200 --> 00:07:24,400 all you know start as early as you can.

148 00:07:24,400 --> 00:07:26,966 Regardless if you're going in for grant

149 00:07:26,966 --> 00:07:29,533 for an organization or for an individual

150 00:07:29,533 --> 00:07:32,633 it always pays to start as early as you

151 00:07:32,633 --> 00:07:36,733 can in the process. A lot of times

152 00:07:36,733 --> 00:07:39,166 particularly if you're looking for

153 00:07:39,166 --> 00:07:42,300 funding as part of an organization, you

154 00:07:42,300 --> 00:07:44,733 need to think about projects that can be

155 00:07:44,733 --> 00:07:48,133 funded rather than necessarily looking

156 00:07:48,133 --> 00:07:50,900 for ongoing funding. So you'll want to 157 00:07:50,900 --> 00:07:53,766 think about fundable projects. And you'll

158 00:07:53,766 --> 00:07:57,166 want to, early on in the process, make

159 00:07:57,166 --> 00:08:00,800 sure you have all of your internal ducks

160 00:08:00,800 --> 00:08:04,533 lined up. And that's again what I just

161 00:08:04,533 --> 00:08:08,333 was reiterating. In a university setting

162 00:08:08,333 --> 00:08:10,033 you know you'll you'll want to make sure

163 00:08:10,033 --> 00:08:12,833 you've touched base with your department

164 00:08:12,833 --> 00:08:15,900 administrator, your your department chair,

165 00:08:15,900 --> 00:08:18,566 who will probably then go forward with

166 00:08:18,566 --> 00:08:20,766 the Dean Provost depending on the size

167 00:08:20,766 --> 00:08:23,866 of the grant, the Research Office and the

168 00:08:23,866 --> 00:08:27,000 Development Office. If you're in a 169 00:08:27,000 --> 00:08:29,300 nonprofit world generally you're going

170 00:08:29,300 --> 00:08:30,933 to be working with your Executive

171 00:08:30,933 --> 00:08:33,000 Director or if they're larger

172 00:08:33,000 --> 00:08:35,600 organization they will have their own

173 00:08:35,600 --> 00:08:37,900 Development Office that you work with

174 00:08:37,900 --> 00:08:41,600 and sometimes you will be working with

175 00:08:41,600 --> 00:08:46,000 the Board of Trustees of that or Board

176 00:08:46,000 --> 00:08:48,066 of Directors rather, for that

177 00:08:48,066 --> 00:08:51,800 organization. So, one of the things as

178 00:08:51,800 --> 00:08:53,600 you're putting projects together you

179 00:08:53,600 --> 00:08:55,833 want to you know make sure you evaluate

180 00:08:55,833 --> 00:08:58,966 them and make sure they're high-impact 181 00:08:58,966 --> 00:09:01,366 that they really are working very

182 00:09:01,366 --> 00:09:04,633 closely with your mission and goals

183 00:09:04,633 --> 00:09:08,000 and that they are achievable. So you want

184 00:09:08,000 --> 00:09:09,700 to make sure that you have the resources

185 00:09:09,700 --> 00:09:13,133 in order to carry out the project that

186 00:09:13,133 --> 00:09:15,933 you're proposing. And that can be just as

187 00:09:15,933 --> 00:09:18,866 simple as having an office space for a

188 00:09:18,866 --> 00:09:21,933 staff person to work in. Or if you're

189 00:09:21,933 --> 00:09:23,933 going to be carrying out certain work

190 00:09:23,933 --> 00:09:25,700 making sure you have the equipment in

191 00:09:25,700 --> 00:09:29,000 place. And if not including it in your

192 00:09:29,000 --> 00:09:31,900 proposal. There's nothing worse than 193 00:09:31,900 --> 00:09:35,133 having a grant and then realizing, "Oh gee,

194 00:09:35,133 --> 00:09:39,200 you know, I forgot to include money for

195 00:09:39,200 --> 00:09:41,100 benefits for the person we can't hire

196 00:09:41,100 --> 00:09:43,733 them if they don't have benefits." So you

197 00:09:43,733 --> 00:09:45,100 want to make sure that you have

198 00:09:45,100 --> 00:09:47,133 everything in place in order to carry

199 00:09:47,133 --> 00:09:50,800 out that project. So I mentioned that you

200 00:09:50,800 --> 00:09:54,566 want to think about fundable projects

201 00:09:54,566 --> 00:09:57,466 organizations, charitable organizations,

202 00:09:57,466 --> 00:10:01,233 often don't like to permanently carry a

203 00:10:01,233 --> 00:10:05,000 non-profit. They want to be able to help

204 00:10:05,000 --> 00:10:07,200 them get started. 205 00:10:07,200 --> 00:10:10,266 Provide discrete funding, one-time

206 00:10:10,266 --> 00:10:12,800 funding that can sometimes be renewed

207 00:10:12,800 --> 00:10:15,600 depending on the organization. So it

208 00:10:15,600 --> 00:10:18,266 becomes your job as a fundraiser for

209 00:10:18,266 --> 00:10:20,900 your organization to try to creatively

210 00:10:20,900 --> 00:10:24,000 think about, "Well which of our needs can

211 00:10:24,000 --> 00:10:27,300 we pull out (&) form into a project that

212 00:10:27,300 --> 00:10:31,100 would be attractive to a funder?" So be

213 00:10:31,100 --> 00:10:33,533 thinking along those lines. There are

214 00:10:33,533 --> 00:10:36,433 funds available for general support for

215 00:10:36,433 --> 00:10:39,933 organizations, but those are highly

216 00:10:39,933 --> 00:10:44,600 competitive. So if you can think of in 217 00:10:44,600 --> 00:10:47,166 terms of one-time funding projects

218 00:10:47,166 --> 00:10:49,366 that's a little bit better. And this

219 00:10:49,366 --> 00:10:51,433 gives you just an idea of some of the

220 00:10:51,433 --> 00:10:54,033 types of projects that you can come up

221 00:10:54,033 --> 00:10:57,266 with. Again to take stress off of your

222 00:10:57,266 --> 00:11:02,100 ongoing budget. Staff, renovations,

223 00:11:02,100 --> 00:11:05,700 equipment, programming, and then of course

224 00:11:05,700 --> 00:11:07,900 you guys know research. That's an obvious

225 00:11:07,900 --> 00:11:12,666 to. Travel. Okay, for students looking to

226 00:11:12,666 --> 00:11:15,200 travel to go to conferences that can

227 00:11:15,200 --> 00:11:19,000 also be something that you look into.

228 00:11:19,000 --> 00:11:22,100 Researching your funders is key and I 229 00:11:22,100 --> 00:11:24,333 can't emphasize this enough and this is

230 00:11:24,333 --> 00:11:27,266 really what the major emphasis of

231 00:11:27,266 --> 00:11:29,666 today's workshop is going to be - How to

232 00:11:29,666 --> 00:11:32,900 go about researching the funders. Because

233 00:11:32,900 --> 00:11:36,400 generally what you're trying to do is

234 00:11:36,400 --> 00:11:41,633 find funders who whose mission and goals

235 00:11:41,633 --> 00:11:43,500 are going to be furthered by your

236 00:11:43,500 --> 00:11:47,900 research. Ok? Or your work your

237 00:11:47,900 --> 00:11:51,100 organization's work. So that it becomes a

238 00:11:51,100 --> 00:11:53,500 marriage of sorts. You know by funding

239 00:11:53,500 --> 00:11:56,100 your work they're getting their goals

240 00:11:56,100 --> 00:11:59,300 and missions accomplished. So we 241 00:11:59,300 --> 00:12:04,100 recommend that you start by using a

242 00:12:04,100 --> 00:12:09,666 database or two, generating a list, and

243 00:12:09,666 --> 00:12:13,633 then refining it using other sources to

244 00:12:13,633 --> 00:12:16,800 gain more information about the

245 00:12:16,800 --> 00:12:21,400 funder. Looking at at other criteria. And

246 00:12:21,400 --> 00:12:25,900 what are those criteria? These are some

247 00:12:25,900 --> 00:12:27,266 of the things you're going to be looking

248 00:12:27,266 --> 00:12:28,600 for. You're going to be looking for

249 00:12:28,600 --> 00:12:30,700 funders who are interested in funding in

250 00:12:30,700 --> 00:12:34,566 your geographic area. That is a big one.

251 00:12:34,566 --> 00:12:36,100 Believe it or not. There are a lot of

252 00:12:36,100 --> 00:12:39,000 foundations there that focus just on 253 00:12:39,000 --> 00:12:41,733 their own community. So you want to be

254 00:12:41,733 --> 00:12:44,500 sure that your area where you're located

255 00:12:44,500 --> 00:12:46,300 where your research is going to be

256 00:12:46,300 --> 00:12:49,866 carried out or your project. That it

257 00:12:49,866 --> 00:12:52,833 matches the funder's interests. The

258 00:12:52,833 --> 00:12:55,700 subject area. So you're interested in

259 00:12:55,700 --> 00:12:58,333 Disasters? Physical therapy? That's

260 00:12:58,333 --> 00:12:59,700 something you would want to make sure

261 00:12:59,700 --> 00:13:04,366 that the the funder is interested in.

262 00:13:04,366 --> 00:13:09,933 Types of support. The most obvious one

263 00:13:09,933 --> 00:13:12,933 that I can think of are scholarships,

264 00:13:12,933 --> 00:13:16,500 fellowships for graduate students for 265 00:13:16,500 --> 00:13:19,566 example. You'll want to make sure that

266 00:13:19,566 --> 00:13:23,100 the organization funds scholarships to

267 00:13:23,100 --> 00:13:26,233 individuals okay and or fellowships to

268 00:13:26,233 --> 00:13:30,166 individuals. Other types of support: Capital

269 00:13:30,166 --> 00:13:34,600 Campaigns. Or research is another type of

270 00:13:34,600 --> 00:13:36,600 support. So those are the kinds of things

271 00:13:36,600 --> 00:13:40,100 that you can put in. Other factors come

272 00:13:40,100 --> 00:13:43,000 become critical when you're looking at

273 00:13:43,000 --> 00:13:46,566 support for individual research or for

274 00:13:46,566 --> 00:13:49,400 individual scholarship. There are

275 00:13:49,400 --> 00:13:53,266 fellowships out there for things

276 00:13:53,266 --> 00:13:55,733 categories that pertain to your own 277 00:13:55,733 --> 00:13:58,833 personal experience. So if you have a

278 00:13:58,833 --> 00:14:01,700 veteran status there may be other

279 00:14:01,700 --> 00:14:04,000 opportunities are available. If you're a

280 00:14:04,000 --> 00:14:06,300 woman there may be other opportunities.

281 00:14:06,300 --> 00:14:10,266 Person of color, etc. So you're going to

282 00:14:10,266 --> 00:14:14,400 be on the lookout for that as well. I

283 00:14:14,400 --> 00:14:17,000 want to just make sure we understand the

284 00:14:17,000 --> 00:14:18,633 types of funders that we're talking

285 00:14:18,633 --> 00:14:21,000 about. Because in a minute I'm going to

286 00:14:21,000 --> 00:14:25,133 show you a few databases and they differ

287 00:14:25,133 --> 00:14:27,200 in terms of the types of funders that

288 00:14:27,200 --> 00:14:30,333 are included. So I won't go into great 289 00:14:30,333 --> 00:14:32,633 detail but what you see up here on the

290 00:14:32,633 --> 00:14:35,800 screen are the most common funders. I'm

291 00:14:35,800 --> 00:14:37,700 gonna try to put a little bit more focus

292 00:14:37,700 --> 00:14:42,333 on private foundations simply because,

293 00:14:42,333 --> 00:14:45,700 well a number of reasons, but we are

294 00:14:45,700 --> 00:14:47,966 affiliated with the Foundation Center. We

295 00:14:47,966 --> 00:14:50,066 meaning: University of Delaware. Affiliated

296 00:14:50,066 --> 00:14:51,500 with the Foundation Center that's

297 00:14:51,500 --> 00:14:53,933 located in New York City. And they

298 00:14:53,933 --> 00:14:55,800 basically serve as a clearinghouse for

299 00:14:55,800 --> 00:14:58,266 information on private foundations.

300 00:14:58,266 --> 00:15:01,566 Private foundations are organizations 301 00:15:01,566 --> 00:15:03,700 nonprofit organizations that are set up

302 00:15:03,700 --> 00:15:06,433 with the sole purpose of giving away

303 00:15:06,433 --> 00:15:10,200 money. And they are required by law to

304 00:15:10,200 --> 00:15:14,200 give away a certain percentage a year. So

305 00:15:14,200 --> 00:15:17,766 they are really good sources to apply

306 00:15:17,766 --> 00:15:20,333 and a lot of times

307 00:15:20,333 --> 00:15:24,700 researchers, fundraisers, prefer to

308 00:15:24,700 --> 00:15:27,500 approach private foundations because

309 00:15:27,500 --> 00:15:30,300 sometimes the process is much simpler.

310 00:15:30,300 --> 00:15:33,166 the application can be as simple as a

311 00:15:33,166 --> 00:15:39,000 letter with a budget attached. So it can

312 00:15:39,000 --> 00:15:41,966 be that simple. On the other hand your 313 00:15:41,966 --> 00:15:43,300 larger foundations have

314 00:15:43,300 --> 00:15:47,800 a much more robust application procedure.

315 00:15:47,800 --> 00:15:51,966 There can also be fewer red tags say

316 00:15:51,966 --> 00:15:55,800 then applying for federal funding. Again

318 00:15:58,166 --> 00:16:00,466 generally those are some of the things

319 00:16:00,466 --> 00:16:04,766 that I hear as to why researchers like

320 00:16:04,766 --> 00:16:09,300 to approach private foundations. Let me

321 00:16:09,300 --> 00:16:11,566 interject too, because I don't want to

322 00:16:11,566 --> 00:16:14,900 forget this, oftentimes people will ask

323 00:16:14,900 --> 00:16:17,533 me, "Well okay, we're going to be

324 00:16:17,533 --> 00:16:21,733 researching private foundations and 325 00:16:21,733 --> 00:16:23,533 other funders why do I need to go

326 00:16:23,533 --> 00:16:25,300 through a database? Why can't I just

327 00:16:25,300 --> 00:16:28,433 Google this?" Private foundations in

328 00:16:28,433 --> 00:16:32,000 particular often have many of them have

329 00:16:32,000 --> 00:16:35,133 small staff. They don't want applications

330 00:16:35,133 --> 00:16:38,300 from all over the world. So they don't

331 00:16:38,300 --> 00:16:41,733 have websites. There are less than half

332 00:16:41,733 --> 00:16:45,300 private foundations - and there are more

333 00:16:45,300 --> 00:16:48,133 than 140,000 private foundations - less

334 00:16:48,133 --> 00:16:51,200 than half have websites. So if you're

335 00:16:51,200 --> 00:16:55,033 only relying on Google to find your

336 00:16:55,033 --> 00:16:57,633 funders you're missing out on a lot of 337 00:16:57,633 --> 00:17:02,366 money. So that's why we recommend using a

338 00:17:02,366 --> 00:17:05,233 database. And in particular for private

339 00:17:05,233 --> 00:17:08,333 foundations I highly recommend using the

340 00:17:08,333 --> 00:17:09,933 Foundation Directory - Online Professional

341 00:17:09,933 --> 00:17:12,166 which is one of the databases we're

342 00:17:12,166 --> 00:17:14,966 going to take a look at. There are other

343 00:17:14,966 --> 00:17:17,733 useful sources for funding for graduate

344 00:17:17,733 --> 00:17:19,300 students particularly you'll want to

345 00:17:19,300 --> 00:17:21,333 look at the professional associations in

346 00:17:21,333 --> 00:17:23,500 your area they often give grants for

347 00:17:23,500 --> 00:17:28,366 travel. Prizes for research, that kind of

348 00:17:28,366 --> 00:17:29,866 thing. So you'll want to be on the 349 00:17:29,866 --> 00:17:33,500 lookout for that. Public charities it's

350 00:17:33,500 --> 00:17:35,866 another good source. Public charities or

351 00:17:35,866 --> 00:17:38,866 nonprofit organizations that conduct

352 00:17:38,866 --> 00:17:43,833 programs but also make grants. Sometimes

353 00:17:43,833 --> 00:17:45,933 they call themselves a foundation but

354 00:17:45,933 --> 00:17:48,533 that their tax status really is not the

355 00:17:48,533 --> 00:17:52,766 same as a private foundation's. A good

356 00:17:52,766 --> 00:17:54,933 example is the Make-A-Wish

357 00:17:54,933 --> 00:17:57,066 foundatian. Although I think they've now

358 00:17:57,066 --> 00:17:59,066 dropped the foundation from their name.

359 00:17:59,066 --> 00:18:01,166 Because they're not a foundation they're

360 00:18:01,166 --> 00:18:03,633 public charity. They raise money but they 361 00:18:03,633 --> 00:18:08,900 also give money. So corporations good

362 00:18:08,900 --> 00:18:14,100 source. They often want to fund projects

363 00:18:14,100 --> 00:18:16,633 that are going to provide a little

364 00:18:16,633 --> 00:18:19,700 goodwill in their community. Give them

365 00:18:19,700 --> 00:18:23,466 some good publicity. So they can also be

366 00:18:23,466 --> 00:18:25,066 helpful. They're probably the most

367 00:18:25,066 --> 00:18:28,000 elusive category to find though because

368 00:18:28,000 --> 00:18:32,466 they're not required by law to say who

369 00:18:32,466 --> 00:18:35,966 they give to. So that can require a fair

370 00:18:35,966 --> 00:18:38,700 amount of digging to find corporations

371 00:18:38,700 --> 00:18:41,100 that are good for support. Government

372 00:18:41,100 --> 00:18:43,433 agencies we will take a look at some of 373 00:18:43,433 --> 00:18:47,600 those. For those for those of us here in

374 00:18:47,600 --> 00:18:50,000 the state of Delaware if you're looking

375 00:18:50,000 --> 00:18:53,000 for funding from the state, the state

376 00:18:53,000 --> 00:18:55,166 website is the best source.

377 00:18:55,166 --> 00:18:57,500 None of the databases that I'm going to

378 00:18:57,500 --> 00:18:59,500 show you are especially good for

379 00:18:59,500 --> 00:19:05,000 locating Delaware state funding. Any

380 00:19:05,000 --> 00:19:06,733 questions about that so far?

381 00:19:06,733 --> 00:19:08,200 I'm guessing you guys probably don't

382 00:19:08,200 --> 00:19:09,966 care where your money comes from right?

383 00:19:09,966 --> 00:19:11,933 Is that true?

384 00:19:11,933 --> 00:19:15,500 Okay. So we'll we'll we'll take a look at 385 00:19:15,500 --> 00:19:17,533 all of the databases and then you can

386 00:19:17,533 --> 00:19:19,866 pick and choose who you actually apply

387 00:19:19,866 --> 00:19:24,166 to. So you're going to use the databases

388 00:19:24,166 --> 00:19:26,600 to generate a broad list. These are the

389 00:19:26,600 --> 00:19:29,966 primary ones that are available to you

390 00:19:29,966 --> 00:19:32,066 here at the University of Delaware. The

391 00:19:32,066 --> 00:19:35,133 first three are subscription databases

392 00:19:35,133 --> 00:19:37,800 (i.e. - the Library pays for them so that

393 00:19:37,800 --> 00:19:40,733 you can have access to them). The

394 00:19:40,733 --> 00:19:43,966 fourth one is the only one that is free

395 00:19:43,966 --> 00:19:45,833 on the internet. And that's Grants.gov.

396 00:19:45,833 --> 00:19:50,400 That is the primary portal for 397 00:19:50,400 --> 00:19:54,200 government funding. I'm not going to show

398 00:19:54,200 --> 00:19:56,833 you Grants.gov today because the

399 00:19:56,833 --> 00:19:59,700 information that is provided in

400 00:19:59,700 --> 00:20:03,633 Grants.gov is also available in COS

401 00:20:03,633 --> 00:20:05,566 Pivot. And I think the searching

402 00:20:05,566 --> 00:20:06,766 interface

403 00:20:06,766 --> 00:20:10,166 in COS Pivot is better. So we will look

404 00:20:10,166 --> 00:20:13,600 at COS Pivot, Foundation Directory Online

405 00:20:13,600 --> 00:20:17,066 Professional, and the Foundation Grants

406 00:20:17,066 --> 00:20:20,533 to Individuals. So I have mentioned

407 00:20:20,533 --> 00:20:23,033 private foundations a little bit.

408 00:20:23,033 --> 00:20:25,233 The Foundation Directory Online 409 00:20:25,233 --> 00:20:28,266 is the best source for private

410 00:20:28,266 --> 00:20:30,366 foundations. It includes all private

411 00:20:30,366 --> 00:20:33,066 foundations. So we know if we go there we

412 00:20:33,066 --> 00:20:37,600 have got all of them. And over the years

413 00:20:37,600 --> 00:20:39,466 they have added different types of

414 00:20:39,466 --> 00:20:42,766 funders to the database. So they do

415 00:20:42,766 --> 00:20:45,833 include now some of the larger corporate

416 00:20:45,833 --> 00:20:49,533 givers. And they also include now some of

417 00:20:49,533 --> 00:20:51,733 the federal government funders as well.

418 00:20:51,733 --> 00:20:55,666 So it's this is a great source. You can

419 00:20:55,666 --> 00:20:58,366 access it anywhere on campus. You can

420 00:20:58,366 --> 00:21:01,633 also access it from home, although you'll 421 00:21:01,633 --> 00:21:04,866 have to proxy and login with your UDel

422 00:21:04,866 --> 00:21:10,066 net and password. If you follow

423 00:21:10,066 --> 00:21:12,200 the instructions on the sheets that I

424 00:21:12,200 --> 00:21:13,900 gave you you'll have no trouble getting

425 00:21:13,900 --> 00:21:17,366 into Foundation Directory Online from

426 00:21:17,366 --> 00:21:19,733 home should you choose to do so.

427 00:21:19,733 --> 00:21:22,966 Foundation Grants to Individuals is a

428 00:21:22,966 --> 00:21:25,766 companion database as the title suggests.

429 00:21:25,766 --> 00:21:30,100 Though it is geared for those of you who

430 00:21:30,100 --> 00:21:32,966 are looking for funding to apply not as

431 00:21:32,966 --> 00:21:35,833 part of an official University project

432 00:21:35,833 --> 00:21:42,433 but as an individual scholar. So students 433 00:21:42,433 --> 00:21:45,333 who are looking for funding this is a

434 00:21:45,333 --> 00:21:47,866 great database for you to try. This

435 00:21:47,866 --> 00:21:50,666 particular database though is only

436 00:21:50,666 --> 00:21:54,966 searchable from within the library on

437 00:21:54,966 --> 00:21:58,433 library computers. Hardwired computers.

438 00:21:58,433 --> 00:22:01,833 Not even laptops. So we have special

439 00:22:01,833 --> 00:22:04,866 logins for you to use today. But normally

440 00:22:04,866 --> 00:22:06,400 what you have to do is physically come

441 00:22:06,400 --> 00:22:09,600 into the building, and sit down, use one

442 00:22:09,600 --> 00:22:12,066 of the library computers to get in to

443 00:22:12,066 --> 00:22:18,633 that database. And just so you know that

444 00:22:18,633 --> 00:22:19,966 as I said the companion 445 00:22:19,966 --> 00:22:23,166 databases is the foundation directory if

446 00:22:23,166 --> 00:22:25,866 you're looking for funding as part of

447 00:22:25,866 --> 00:22:29,400 the University definitely stick with the

448 00:22:29,400 --> 00:22:32,633 Foundation Directory. Individuals again

449 00:22:32,633 --> 00:22:36,333 you'll want to use this database.

450 00:22:36,333 --> 00:22:41,566 Pivot I have alluded to. Pivot started

451 00:22:41,566 --> 00:22:44,066 down at Johns Hopkins in their research

452 00:22:44,066 --> 00:22:47,233 office. So it has a very heavy emphasis

453 00:22:47,233 --> 00:22:51,233 on research. But if you are working with

454 00:22:51,233 --> 00:22:54,800 a social service organization you can

455 00:22:54,800 --> 00:22:58,066 also find funding in there as well. It is

456 00:22:58,066 --> 00:23:01,433 really good for finding federal 457 00:23:01,433 --> 00:23:03,600 funding. And that's what I really like

458 00:23:03,600 --> 00:23:08,366 about it best. It also includes a very

459 00:23:08,366 --> 00:23:12,133 little bit of state funding and also

460 00:23:12,133 --> 00:23:16,133 some nonprofit other nonprofits and

461 00:23:16,133 --> 00:23:18,100 professional associations are

462 00:23:18,100 --> 00:23:22,100 represented there. Both this database

463 00:23:22,100 --> 00:23:25,800 Pivot and the Foundation Directory are

464 00:23:25,800 --> 00:23:28,333 attempting to become international.

465 00:23:28,333 --> 00:23:30,833 They're slowly moving in that direction

466 00:23:30,833 --> 00:23:35,300 and I'd say right now you can count on

467 00:23:35,300 --> 00:23:37,600 Western Europe being fairly well

468 00:23:37,600 --> 00:23:39,266 represented. 469 00:23:39,266 --> 00:23:43,900 Especially the UK. And they're now also

470 00:23:43,900 --> 00:23:47,466 branching down into Australia, up to

471 00:23:47,466 --> 00:23:51,500 Canada, and starting to pick up China as

472 00:23:51,500 --> 00:23:54,100 well. So you're starting to see some

473 00:23:54,100 --> 00:23:56,833 diversification, but it does have a very

474 00:23:56,833 --> 00:24:02,866 significant Western slant. Let's see... This

475 00:24:02,866 --> 00:24:06,066 one is also accessible from anywhere on

476 00:24:06,066 --> 00:24:09,800 campus and again at home. This one also

477 00:24:09,800 --> 00:24:12,633 has some special features that I'll

478 00:24:12,633 --> 00:24:15,433 mention a little bit later. But if you're

479 00:24:15,433 --> 00:24:18,066 looking for funding on an ongoing basis

480 00:24:18,066 --> 00:24:20,200 I would highly recommend for this 481 00:24:20,200 --> 00:24:21,966 database that you create your own

482 00:24:21,966 --> 00:24:24,533 username and password and set up a login.

483 00:24:24,533 --> 00:24:27,266 And that way you can take advantage of

484 00:24:27,266 --> 00:24:31,100 the special features.

485 00:24:31,100 --> 00:24:34,233 And then Grants.gov as I said is the

486 00:24:34,233 --> 00:24:36,833 place where you can go to search for

487 00:24:36,833 --> 00:24:39,533 federal funding. And once you leave the

488 00:24:39,533 --> 00:24:41,266 University if you're totally

489 00:24:41,266 --> 00:24:45,466 unaffiliated with any other university

490 00:24:45,466 --> 00:24:48,233 that provides COS Pivot or another

491 00:24:48,233 --> 00:24:50,866 funding database you can always use

492 00:24:50,866 --> 00:24:54,900 Grants.gov to find federal funding. And I 493 00:24:54,900 --> 00:24:57,600 want to emphasize again you can use it

494 00:24:57,600 --> 00:25:01,233 now to look for funding but please do

495 00:25:01,233 --> 00:25:06,700 not attempt to apply for any grant going

496 00:25:06,700 --> 00:25:09,966 out under the University's name through

497 00:25:09,966 --> 00:25:12,466 Grants.gov. Only the research office can

498 00:25:12,466 --> 00:25:15,033 do that, okay? You can look and see what's

499 00:25:15,033 --> 00:25:18,366 available but the site is also the

500 00:25:18,366 --> 00:25:20,966 portal where people submit applications.

501 00:25:20,966 --> 00:25:23,433 But only the research office is

502 00:25:23,433 --> 00:25:25,866 authorized to submit on behalf of the

503 00:25:25,866 --> 00:25:28,300 University. So once you go through the

504 00:25:28,300 --> 00:25:30,433 databases and come up with a list and 505 00:25:30,433 --> 00:25:33,700 all the databases allow you to download

506 00:25:33,700 --> 00:25:37,633 information to a spreadsheet or you know

507 00:25:37,633 --> 00:25:41,233 download individual PDFs. What you want

508 00:25:41,233 --> 00:25:45,033 to do is think of that information as a

509 00:25:45,033 --> 00:25:48,900 starting point. Just a list to help you

510 00:25:48,900 --> 00:25:51,466 figure out who it is you want to look at.

511 00:25:51,466 --> 00:25:53,300 And then you really want to take a much

512 00:25:53,300 --> 00:25:57,400 closer, more more in-depth look, at the

513 00:25:57,400 --> 00:26:00,400 organizations on your list. The first

514 00:26:00,400 --> 00:26:02,500 place to go would be to see if they have

515 00:26:02,500 --> 00:26:05,366 a website. The databases will give

516 00:26:05,366 --> 00:26:07,433 you a link to the website if they have 517 00:26:07,433 --> 00:26:09,466 them. So you'll definitely want to go

518 00:26:09,466 --> 00:26:11,300 over to the website and do more

519 00:26:11,300 --> 00:26:13,900 comprehensive reading at the website.

520 00:26:13,900 --> 00:26:18,666 Also a lot of them are now pushing out

521 00:26:18,666 --> 00:26:21,866 publications, newsletters, annual reports.

522 00:26:21,866 --> 00:26:23,866 Again you'll take a look at those kinds

523 00:26:23,866 --> 00:26:27,533 of things to see if they just clarify

524 00:26:27,533 --> 00:26:30,500 the giving picture for that particular

525 00:26:30,500 --> 00:26:34,233 organization. A lot of the funders too

526 00:26:34,233 --> 00:26:37,800 are engaging in social media so you can

527 00:26:37,800 --> 00:26:41,133 follow them on Twitter, friend them on

528 00:26:41,133 --> 00:26:43,266 Facebook, etc. 529 00:26:43,266 --> 00:26:46,700 Okay? And again the the purpose of doing

530 00:26:46,700 --> 00:26:48,433 that is twofold. Its to help you

531 00:26:48,433 --> 00:26:51,666 understand what they're doing but it's

532 00:26:51,666 --> 00:26:55,133 also to get you on their radar as well.

533 00:26:55,133 --> 00:26:56,766 Particularly if you're working with a

534 00:26:56,766 --> 00:27:00,166 community organization you want people

535 00:27:00,166 --> 00:27:02,466 to be seeing what your organization is

536 00:27:02,466 --> 00:27:05,333 doing so that you know when you approach

537 00:27:05,333 --> 00:27:08,300 them you know they know! It's like,

538 00:27:08,300 --> 00:27:11,466 "Oh yeah I've heard of them!" So that helps.

539 00:27:11,466 --> 00:27:13,700 Newspaper sources can be great

540 00:27:13,700 --> 00:27:15,233 particularly if you're going after 541 00:27:15,233 --> 00:27:18,366 funding for corporations. As I said

542 00:27:18,366 --> 00:27:20,233 corporations tend to give in their own

543 00:27:20,233 --> 00:27:23,633 communities. So your local newspaper is a

544 00:27:23,633 --> 00:27:26,366 great source. So get used to looking and

545 00:27:26,366 --> 00:27:29,533 finding you know out who's giving in the

546 00:27:29,533 --> 00:27:32,933 Delaware area. And the library has a

547 00:27:32,933 --> 00:27:35,266 number of newspaper databases that are

548 00:27:35,266 --> 00:27:39,200 good for searching online. Not only local

549 00:27:39,200 --> 00:27:40,966 newspapers but other newspapers

550 00:27:40,966 --> 00:27:43,833 throughout the U.S. Lastly there's

551 00:27:43,833 --> 00:27:46,833 personal contacts. And you'll notice that

552 00:27:46,833 --> 00:27:48,666 in all of the databases they give you 553 00:27:48,666 --> 00:27:51,200 information about who the Executive

554 00:27:51,200 --> 00:27:57,133 Directors are, who the

555 00:27:57,133 --> 00:27:59,900 staff is, who the Board of Directors

556 00:27:59,900 --> 00:28:03,433 are, etc. And the Foundation Directory in

557 00:28:03,433 --> 00:28:05,200 particular has started relying on

558 00:28:05,200 --> 00:28:08,000 LinkedIn as a what as a way too

559 00:28:08,000 --> 00:28:11,700 of connecting. And again it's to take

560 00:28:11,700 --> 00:28:14,966 advantage of person-to-person contacts.

561 00:28:14,966 --> 00:28:19,233 So but particularly if you're working in

562 00:28:19,233 --> 00:28:21,700 a nonprofit organization you're gonna

563 00:28:21,700 --> 00:28:24,333 want to have chats with your Board of

564 00:28:24,333 --> 00:28:27,366 Directors and find out if they know of 565 00:28:27,366 --> 00:28:31,833 any of the people who may sit on the

566 00:28:31,833 --> 00:28:33,233 Board of Directors with these other

567 00:28:33,233 --> 00:28:36,700 foundations. Because as much as we like

568 00:28:36,700 --> 00:28:38,766 to think that this is an open process

569 00:28:38,766 --> 00:28:44,133 and anyone can apply, people-to-people

570 00:28:44,133 --> 00:28:47,200 relationships still weigh pretty heavily.

571 00:28:47,200 --> 00:28:50,600 So you don't want to ignore that. Well

572 00:28:50,600 --> 00:28:54,100 I think we are getting close to moving

573 00:28:54,100 --> 00:28:56,000 over into the databases

574 00:28:56,000 --> 00:28:58,233 to do our search. But I want to mention

575 00:28:58,233 --> 00:29:01,433 before we do - For those of you who have

576 00:29:01,433 --> 00:29:04,133 never written grant proposals before I 577 00:29:04,133 --> 00:29:07,233 highly recommend going to visit

578 00:29:07,233 --> 00:29:10,000 grantspace.org. And that's one of the

579 00:29:10,000 --> 00:29:13,733 websites that's in your - on the agenda in

580 00:29:13,733 --> 00:29:16,933 the little box at the bottom. That

581 00:29:16,933 --> 00:29:20,766 website has references to tutorials that

582 00:29:20,766 --> 00:29:23,033 you can walk through that will tell you

583 00:29:23,033 --> 00:29:25,600 how to write a grant proposal, how to put

584 00:29:25,600 --> 00:29:28,000 a budget together, how to approach a

585 00:29:28,000 --> 00:29:30,266 funder... Basically everything! It's all

586 00:29:30,266 --> 00:29:32,133 there. It's a really great website. I

587 00:29:32,133 --> 00:29:35,533 cannot recommend it highly enough. There

588 00:29:35,533 --> 00:29:40,066 are also links to some sample documents. 589 00:29:40,066 --> 00:29:45,466 Not a lot, but a few. There are also links

590 00:29:45,466 --> 00:29:48,666 to the Foundation Center publications.

591 00:29:48,666 --> 00:29:50,566 And I brought just a few of them to show

592 00:29:50,566 --> 00:29:54,133 you. They don't give away their books

593 00:29:54,133 --> 00:29:57,200 that they sell online. So alas they'll

594 00:29:57,200 --> 00:29:59,000 give you excerpts but but they won't

595 00:29:59,000 --> 00:30:02,100 give you the full book. If you've never

596 00:30:02,100 --> 00:30:04,033 written a grant proposal before this is

597 00:30:04,033 --> 00:30:06,100 a great one [Guide to Proposal Writing]. Walks you through the whole

598 00:30:06,100 --> 00:30:09,700 process. And I'll leave these up here if

599 00:30:09,700 --> 00:30:11,100 you want to come and take a look later

600 00:30:11,100 --> 00:30:15,300 you can. They also put out "The Grant 601 00:30:15,300 --> 00:30:17,666 Seeker's Guide to Winning Proposals". Which

602 00:30:17,666 --> 00:30:20,400 has not only copies of proposals the

603 00:30:20,400 --> 00:30:22,400 actual proposals that have gone to

604 00:30:22,400 --> 00:30:25,866 private foundations, but it also has the

605 00:30:25,866 --> 00:30:28,600 reviewer's comments on why they liked the

606 00:30:28,600 --> 00:30:30,833 proposals and opted to fund them. And

607 00:30:30,833 --> 00:30:34,333 then the last thing that I brought they

608 00:30:34,333 --> 00:30:36,166 put out a lot of publications but these

609 00:30:36,166 --> 00:30:38,200 three I think are particularly useful [Carol holding the book: "After the Grant"]

610 00:30:38,200 --> 00:30:41,600 This one [Carol holding the book: "After the Grant"] is basically what to do after

611 00:30:41,600 --> 00:30:43,933 the grant. And again this is the

612 00:30:43,933 --> 00:30:46,166 relationship building piece. You know, how 613 00:30:46,166 --> 00:30:48,133 to steward your grant once you get it.

614 00:30:48,133 --> 00:30:50,733 What do you need to do to try to

615 00:30:50,733 --> 00:30:53,800 cultivate a good relationship with that

616 00:30:53,800 --> 00:30:56,733 funder and also perhaps build some with

617 00:30:56,733 --> 00:31:01,300 others. So those are the key publication

618 00:31:01,300 --> 00:31:04,166 guides that you'll find there. For graduate

619 00:31:04,166 --> 00:31:06,400 students you'll also find bibliographies

620 00:31:06,400 --> 00:31:09,233 there on sources that you can use

621 00:31:09,233 --> 00:31:14,066 to help you put together fellowship

622 00:31:14,066 --> 00:31:16,933 applications, fellowship essays, that kind

623 00:31:16,933 --> 00:31:19,233 of thing. And I brought just a couple

624 00:31:19,233 --> 00:31:21,500 that we have from our collection here in 625 00:31:21,500 --> 00:31:25,900 Reference that talk about how to write

626 00:31:25,900 --> 00:31:29,100 winning essays for various foundations

627 00:31:29,100 --> 00:31:32,266 and scholarly organizations that are

628 00:31:32,266 --> 00:31:34,733 putting out funding. And then if you've

629 00:31:34,733 --> 00:31:36,700 never seen the "Chicago Guide To Your

630 00:31:36,700 --> 00:31:39,533 Academic Career", this is also a nice

631 00:31:39,533 --> 00:31:42,000 publication that will talk to you a

638 00:31:56,433 --> 00:32:00,466 information. Gives you a link to the

639 00:32:00,466 --> 00:32:03,700 Foundation Centers, grantspace.org - which

640 00:32:03,700 --> 00:32:06,300 I just talked about - gives you the links

641 00:32:06,300 --> 00:32:11,466 to the library databases, etc. We also

642 00:32:11,466 --> 00:32:16,500 have some of these scholarship and

643 00:32:16,500 --> 00:32:19,900 proposal writing books online as ebooks

644 00:32:19,900 --> 00:32:23,566 that you can check out or read. So I know

645 00:32:23,566 --> 00:32:25,800 nobody likes to come over here and read

646 00:32:25,800 --> 00:32:28,000 books the old-fashioned way anymore, so

647 00:32:28,000 --> 00:32:29,966 we are buying more and more and putting

648 00:32:29,966 --> 00:32:34,766 them online as well as we can. When it 649 00:32:34,766 --> 00:32:37,933 comes to writing just a very few tips

650 00:32:37,933 --> 00:32:40,833 make sure, and I can't emphasize this

651 00:32:40,833 --> 00:32:44,333 enough, make sure you follow the funder's

652 00:32:44,333 --> 00:32:48,400 guidelines meticulously. You know print

653 00:32:48,400 --> 00:32:52,900 them out, read them, highlight them, make

654 00:32:52,900 --> 00:32:55,000 sure you fully understand what it is

655 00:32:55,000 --> 00:32:57,333 they say they want included in the grant.

656 00:32:57,333 --> 00:33:00,133 And make sure you address every single

657 00:33:00,133 --> 00:33:03,533 thing they say they want to see. This is

658 00:33:03,533 --> 00:33:06,633 not the time to be super creative in

659 00:33:06,633 --> 00:33:09,100 terms of what you come up with. Give them

660 00:33:09,100 --> 00:33:11,833 what they want. That's really very very 661 00:33:11,833 --> 00:33:14,566 important. So if they say they want to

662 00:33:14,566 --> 00:33:16,500 hear about sustainability of your

663 00:33:16,500 --> 00:33:18,800 project - you make sure you address that.

664 00:33:18,800 --> 00:33:22,200 And sometimes those opportunities can

665 00:33:22,200 --> 00:33:29,133 have a lot of very specific details that

666 00:33:29,133 --> 00:33:32,800 they want you to touch on. They can even

667 00:33:32,800 --> 00:33:36,800 be so detailed as to tell you what font

668 00:33:36,800 --> 00:33:39,533 they want the proposal in. What size

669 00:33:39,533 --> 00:33:44,066 they want the proposal in, etc. So you

670 00:33:44,066 --> 00:33:45,666 need to make sure you know all of that

671 00:33:45,666 --> 00:33:47,700 you don't want your proposal getting

672 00:33:47,700 --> 00:33:51,266 thrown out because you know you went 673 00:33:51,266 --> 00:33:54,466 over the page limit. Or you use the

674 00:33:54,466 --> 00:33:58,166 wrong font. Federal agencies in

675 00:33:58,166 --> 00:34:03,133 particular receive so many applications

676 00:34:03,133 --> 00:34:07,633 that those first cuts are just based on

677 00:34:07,633 --> 00:34:10,100 technical things. So they're not even

678 00:34:10,100 --> 00:34:12,366 going to read to see if you gave them a

679 00:34:12,366 --> 00:34:14,500 great proposal that's just one page over

680 00:34:14,500 --> 00:34:16,900 the limit. Just one page over the limit

681 00:34:16,900 --> 00:34:19,500 you you don't make it to the first cut.

682 00:34:19,500 --> 00:34:22,600 So there are a few exceptions but

683 00:34:22,600 --> 00:34:24,433 generally don't put yourself into that

684 00:34:24,433 --> 00:34:28,000 category of getting cut because you know 685 00:34:28,000 --> 00:34:33,900 of a technical issue. Also if you can get

686 00:34:33,900 --> 00:34:35,800 someone else to proofread it for you.

687 00:34:35,800 --> 00:34:38,066 Because by the time you have written the

688 00:34:38,066 --> 00:34:40,566 proposal you'll be pretty sick of the

689 00:34:40,566 --> 00:34:42,866 topic, and you will have been staring at

690 00:34:42,866 --> 00:34:46,766 it for probably way too long. And a lot

691 00:34:46,766 --> 00:34:51,366 of things that are problematic you may

692 00:34:51,366 --> 00:34:53,666 not see at that point. So if you can

693 00:34:53,666 --> 00:34:55,800 let someone else look at it. It also

694 00:34:55,800 --> 00:34:57,633 helps too if you get someone who's a

695 00:34:57,633 --> 00:34:59,666 little bit out of your field. They'll be

696 00:34:59,666 --> 00:35:01,633 able to catch any jargon that you may be 697 00:35:01,633 --> 00:35:04,700 using that might be unfamiliar to the

698 00:35:04,700 --> 00:35:07,900 funder. So that's another thing to keep

699 00:35:07,900 --> 00:35:12,133 in mind. Once you submit your proposal

700 00:35:12,133 --> 00:35:14,633 again you have to remember there are

701 00:35:14,633 --> 00:35:16,700 people on the other end. It does not

702 00:35:16,700 --> 00:35:19,266 usually hurt to call, inquire (that) they got

703 00:35:19,266 --> 00:35:21,466 your proposal. That doesn't work with

704 00:35:21,466 --> 00:35:23,133 some of the larger funding agencies

705 00:35:23,133 --> 00:35:25,466 although even the larger funding

706 00:35:25,466 --> 00:35:28,000 agencies have program officers that can

707 00:35:28,000 --> 00:35:29,700 be very helpful.

708 00:35:29,700 --> 00:35:33,500 Many of the program agencies too will 709 00:35:33,500 --> 00:35:35,600 even read drafts of proposals.

710 00:35:35,600 --> 00:35:37,566 Like I've been working with a project

711 00:35:37,566 --> 00:35:38,866 here on campus called "The Colored

712 00:35:38,866 --> 00:35:41,666 Convention Project" and we worked very

713 00:35:41,666 --> 00:35:45,466 closely with the program officer for the

714 00:35:45,466 --> 00:35:47,500 National Endowment for Humanities who

715 00:35:47,500 --> 00:35:50,400 read our draft, gave us positive feedback

716 00:35:50,400 --> 00:35:52,766 critical feedback, and then you know we

717 00:35:52,766 --> 00:35:55,000 went back to the drawing board. And most

718 00:35:55,000 --> 00:35:59,366 of the agencies can do that if you give

719 00:35:59,366 --> 00:36:02,800 them enough time. So that's another thing

720 00:36:02,800 --> 00:36:08,566 to take advantage of. And you know be 721 00:36:08,566 --> 00:36:11,333 nice to the person on the other end!

722 00:36:11,333 --> 00:36:15,400 Remember again it's people-to-people. So

723 00:36:15,400 --> 00:36:17,966 you may be stressed out but try not to

724 00:36:17,966 --> 00:36:20,866 pass that stress on to the person on the

725 00:36:20,866 --> 00:36:26,100 other end of the phone or email. Lastly,

726 00:36:26,100 --> 00:36:29,933 don't get discouraged if you don't get

727 00:36:29,933 --> 00:36:34,433 that funding. There are a lot of really

728 00:36:34,433 --> 00:36:37,066 excellent proposals that don't get

729 00:36:37,066 --> 00:36:40,366 funded. And it's really just a matter of

730 00:36:40,366 --> 00:36:43,666 or it can be a matter of volume. There's

731 00:36:43,666 --> 00:36:46,766 just so many good proposals, limited

732 00:36:46,766 --> 00:36:50,600 dollars, yours may not get funded. If that 733 00:36:50,600 --> 00:36:54,866 happens, by all means contact them. Thank

734 00:36:54,866 --> 00:36:57,366 the agency for considering your proposal.

735 00:36:57,366 --> 00:37:00,866 And ask them if you can get feedback

736 00:37:00,866 --> 00:37:04,566 that on your proposal. A lot of times

737 00:37:04,566 --> 00:37:07,166 you can go through, read the feedback and

738 00:37:07,166 --> 00:37:10,533 decide whether or not you should reapply.

739 00:37:10,533 --> 00:37:14,100 And sometimes the funder will encourage

740 00:37:14,100 --> 00:37:17,466 you to reapply. If they encourage you to

741 00:37:17,466 --> 00:37:20,766 reapply by all means do so. Because there

742 00:37:20,766 --> 00:37:23,933 are a considerable number of grant

743 00:37:23,933 --> 00:37:25,800 proposals that don't get funded the

744 00:37:25,800 --> 00:37:27,766 first time but they do get that 745 00:37:27,766 --> 00:37:31,466 consideration the second time. So you

746 00:37:31,466 --> 00:37:33,400 know, don't give up. On the other hand if

747 00:37:33,400 --> 00:37:35,500 you go through and you read the comments

748 00:37:35,500 --> 00:37:38,133 and you see that your work is just way

749 00:37:38,133 --> 00:37:40,466 out of scope of the funder you know

750 00:37:40,466 --> 00:37:42,100 don't waste your time don't waste their

751 00:37:42,100 --> 00:37:45,133 time. Move on to another organization and

752 00:37:45,133 --> 00:37:47,233 start over. So

753 00:37:47,233 --> 00:37:49,266 and if you do get the grant and it's

754 00:37:49,266 --> 00:37:52,166 positive you know by all means you'll

755 00:37:52,166 --> 00:37:54,100 start to work on developing that

756 00:37:54,100 --> 00:37:56,233 relationship. You write a letter of 757 00:37:56,233 --> 00:37:58,400 thanks. (Actually you do that whether or

758 00:37:58,400 --> 00:38:01,633 not you get funded or not.) And then you

759 00:38:01,633 --> 00:38:05,066 work with the the funder to make sure

760 00:38:05,066 --> 00:38:09,033 that the award gets proper recognition.

761 00:38:09,033 --> 00:38:12,600 Because you know the funding agency

762 00:38:12,600 --> 00:38:14,900 likes to be appreciated and know that

763 00:38:14,900 --> 00:38:18,066 their work is appreciated. So that's

764 00:38:18,066 --> 00:38:20,800 basically where you take it from there.

765 00:38:20,800 --> 00:38:25,766 So I think that is the process from idea

766 00:38:25,766 --> 00:38:31,466 to submission. And let us now jump into

767 00:38:31,466 --> 00:38:34,266 the databases and see where you can take
