Welcome! This tutorial will show you how to access an electronic copy of an article that you discover in one of the library's databases - using the "Get It" system.

Most databases offer a mixture of article citations, which provide information about the article, but are not the articles actual content, as well as full-text articles which are electronic copies of the actual article itself. In the search that I have done here two full-text articles are available within this database. Clicking on these links will bring me directly to the full content of the article that I can read and download. If a database does not have a direct link to an article that you're seeking, click on the "Get It" button to search through all of the library's holdings and connect with a full-text copy of the desired article.

"Get It" offers several ways for you to get to the content that you're seeking. Most often "Get It" will bring you directly to the article as in this case. Seek out the link to the PDF of your article to view its content. If "Get It" cannot link you directly to the article, you may see a screen like this indicating that the article is not available online but may be available in print. Click on the link to DELCAT Discovery to find out if the library has a copy of this journal in its print collection.

Once in DELCAT Discovery, you will need to specify that you're looking for a journal. Use the facets on the left to select journals. Now examine the results.

Items marked with the "University of Delaware Library" are held here at UD. However, the journal that we are seeking is listed as "WorldCat Libraries". This indicates that another library in the system has this journal, but the UD library does not. Therefore in order to get to this article we will have to use the Interlibrary Loan service by using the link to Interlibrary Loan located on the "Get It" screen.

Remember, librarians are always available to assist you. Please feel free to contact a librarian at any time if you cannot access an article that you need or if you would like assistance with any part of your research.
