
Exhibition: Shakespeare Through the Ages

Also on display will be examples of Shakespearean criticism, adaptations, parodies, private press editions, and forgeries, all drawn from the University of Delaware Library's extensive holdings of rare books and manuscripts. All this, and more, will showcase the many ways in which Shakespeare's works have lived on in the four centuries since his death
